




Program Overview

The Honors Undergraduate Thesis program provides students from all disciplines the opportunity to engage in original and independent research as principal investigators. This thesis is published through the university library and is available to researchers worldwide through electronic databases.

Over the course of two to four semesters, students work closely with a faculty committee to research, write, defend and publish an Honors thesis. Upon successful completion of the program, students earn the Honors distinction by selecting one of the following options:


Honors in the Major

Honors in the Major is the oldest and most prestigious undergraduate research program at UCF. Students complete original research or creative work in their major.

New Options Include:

Engineering Thesis

Students in any Engineering major as well as Computer Science can use their Senior Design Project as the basis for an Honors Thesis.



Honors in Research or Honors in Creative Inquiry

The Interdisciplinary Honors Thesis allows students in all majors to complete original research or creative work in a discipline other than their major.

Application Steps

Step 1: Complete the Honors Undergraduate Thesis Eligibility Form. This is an electronic form available on our website: honors.ucf.edu/HIM

Students must meet the following minimum eligibility criteria at the time of application and admission:

- 60 overall hours of completed college credit
- 12 completed upper division hours of college credit
- 3.2 UCF or Overall GPA
- Two semesters remaining prior to graduation

Step 2: Eligible students will receive an invitation to complete an electronic application and registration form.





Research Intensive Course Designation

What is a Research Intensive (RI) course?

An RI course is designated by a campus-wide committee as one that provides curriculum-based active engagement in a line of inquiry that:

- Is guided by a content expert
- Allows students to engage meaningfully in the academic research process
- Includes a research deliverable (poster, paper, etc.)

Why designate your course?

Courses are designated in the catalog as RI. Teaching RI sections of courses will strengthen faculty teaching portfolios.

How do you designate your course?

Section-level designation applications can be submitted by faculty. Course-level submissions must be submitted by department chairs. Proposals are accepted each semester to designate courses for the following semester and including the following:

- · Cover form and memo discussing the merits of the course and course requirements
- An annotated syllabus which highlights rubric items within the objectives. assignments, and course schedule

RESEARCH POSITION DATABASE

WHO? Faculty and graduate students who have research and creative work positions for undergraduates. Positions can be through structured UCF programs, independent projects, or general research support.

WHERE? Go to: http://www.OUR.ucf.edu/research-positions

HOW? To add a position, click on "Post" and log in with your NID and NID password. Click "Add a new listing," and then complete and submit the form. You can return as needed to edit or create additional postings.

DIRECTED INDEPENDENT RESEARCH

WHY? Students and faculty are recognized for their work. Faculty can use this formal enrollment for teaching and research portfolios. Students can document their experience on their transcripts.

HOW? Students should meet with you to discuss any research goals for the semester. You can request an undergraduate registration agreement form from your department. The **ZERO** credit option (no additional tuition charge if the student is already enrolled in other courses*) is only available for Directed Independent Research 4912. Return the form to your department and/or college before the add/drop deadline.

*Students not enrolled in other coursework when enrolled in the ZERO credit option will be charged for 1 credit hour of tuition plus fees.

PEER MENTORING

WHAT? Students can meet with peer mentors who are current undergraduate researchers. In addition to helping students get started with research, peer mentors can also advise current undergraduate researchers about enhancing their research experience through formal programs and opportunities that include funding options.

WHERE? Students should be referred to the Office of Undergraduate Research in Technology Commons II, Suite 209.

HOW? Students can meet with a peer mentor by visiting during drop-in hours or by making an appointment. See http://OUR.ucf.edu for details.



Higher Education Application Guidelines

These are the guidelines for the Higher Education Program. You should also familiarize yourself with the Foundation's general guidelines before beginning the application process.

The Higher Education Program welcomes excellent, innovative proposals from all kinds of institutions and organizations and encourages inquiries from those that are less well-resourced and/or that seek to serve disadvantaged or marginalized communities.

Higher education program grants have several characteristics:

- They support projects in the humanities and qualitative social sciences (with one exception: projects that encourage diversity in certain STEM fields are also supported)
- In general, they will support team-based projects or institutional initiatives rather than purely individual research projects
- The projects they support will not only produce new knowledge but will also model new approaches to the production, dissemination and application of knowledge

Grants awarded to to colleges and universities through the Higher Education Program should focus on at least one of the particular strategies described below:

- Encouraging new approaches to the dissemination of research outside of the academy—including to the general public or to particular communities of interest, like policymakers or practitioners
- Facilitating collaboration, dialogue, or another kind of exchange or partnership between scholars and practitioners or policymakers
- Facilitating and nurturing trans-disciplinary and trans-national research and training, especially across institutional boundaries and barriers of various kinds
- Supporting dialogue and collaboration between US and non-US institutions about higher education goals and strategies, especially in order to strengthen non-US institutions and the higher education sector in other parts of the world
- Supporting innovation in doctoral education, especially in ways that empower graduate students and equip them to thrive personally and professionally in the more challenging contemporary context




How satisfied are you with the transition into the new school?


How satisfied are you with the school's transparency about decision-making?


How satisfied are you with the quality of school leadership?


How satisfied are you with the amount, content and frequency of communication within in the school?










Are you a part of the Fall 2019 move to UCF Downtown?

Transparency

Broad Categories of Comments:

- Negative perceptions attributed to (1) things over which we have little control or (2)
 actions taken in good faith to be helpful but did not work out as intended.
- Critical perceptions suggesting (1) the administration of the school favors programs in NSCM building, (2) school leadership does not understanding disciplines from SVAD, (3) leadership does not value SVAD programs; and (4) the GaIM-FIEA task force was a waste of effort and frustrating to participants.
- Some expressed a desire for more information but understood that leadership may not have any more information than the faculty and staff have.
- Positive comments focused on effectiveness of school and department leaders in managing a complex situation.



Observation #1: Need to clarify roles played by school leadership.

- Organizational structure has changed the role of director. Outward-facing.
- Associate Directors coordinate staff efforts and provide leadership for NSCM committees and assist Department Chairs. Inward-facing.
- Department chairs have assumed administrative tasks appropriate to the title.
 Line administrators who supervise all departmental activities, programs, and evaluate faculty. Closest to the faculty
- All leaders in the school are navigating expectations of two colleges

Observation #2: Areas for improvement in school leadership

- Comments from both ends of the spectrum demonstrate range of perceptions
- Leaders need to be more visible to faculty
- Leaders need to be more accessible to respond to faculty
- Leaders need to encourage faculty governance

New Business: Faculty Senate Election Process

3.1.3. Faculty Senate

- The UCF Faculty Senate is the basic legislative body of the University. The Senate is the primary voice of
 the faculty and serves as the main channel of communication between faculty members and university
 administration. It is an advisory body to the president and provost and, as such, participates in shared
 governance. NSCM is apportioned seats based on the procedures described in the Faculty Constitution.
- At this time, each of three NSCM departments Communication, Film and Mass Media, and Games and Interactive Media/Florida Interactive Entertainment Academy – will elect one senator. Eligible full-time faculty members within each department vote to elect each of three departmental Senate representatives. The remaining Senate seat is elected by the NSCM faculty as a whole. Each departmental senator will serve a 2-year term. The at-large NSCM senator elected by the faculty as a whole will serve a 1-year term. Senators are eligible for re-election.
- Alternate senators are elected by faculty vote for each Senate seat according to the same processes and terms as described above. Whenever possible, alternate senators should be elected from the initial pool of applicants/nominees.

3rd Annual NSCM Advisory Board Outstanding Educator Award

This award is presented to a candidate who has been nominated by his/her peers or self-nominated and meets the criteria of being outstanding in at least two of the three areas (teaching, service, or research).

- Time Frame for Nomination: 2018 (Spring, Summer, Fall)
- Submission of nominations March 1, 2019
- Letter of nomination (or self-nomination)
- Current resume, vita, or professional resume
- One letter of support

Review by Board and selection of inaugural winner – March 29, 2019

Prize: Plaque, +\$1000 to be awarded after May 1, 2019 for any of the following:

- Additional travel funding for 2019-2020
- Books and instructional materials
- Faculty development
- Start-up support for projects
