i. Women that Made a Difference in your life

1. Christine Hanlon

a. Marjorie M. Teitelbaum (Assistant Professor at Bridgewater State College and my 2nd & 4th grade teacher at BSC's Burnell Elementary School) was the first person who "saw something special" in my academic work. She was a graduate of Wellesley College and she was the first feminist who inspired me (and that's an understatement regarding her importance in shaping who I am today).

2. Jamie Kosnosky

a. LaVerne Wheeler was the Executive Director of the Pittsburgh Commission on Human Relations and Manager of Employee Relations at the University of Pittsburgh. She was my first workplace mentor. She was always humble and

downplayed her role in Pittsburgh Civil Rights and her work in the Great Society era. She survived a stalker, death threats, and getting thrown off a bus. She saw something in me and was always pushing me to do better.

3. Deanna Sellnow

a. My Grandma Miller. She modeled perseverance and in seeing challenges as opportunities no matter how difficult. Her faith in and unconditional love for me are a huge part in who I am and try to be today. After several failed surgeries, she went blind from glaucoma and continued to live alone on the farm after grandpa died, planted and harvested a huge garden every year, taught other people to cook without sight at the MN School for the Blind, and completed two correspondence college courses in creative writing. Most important, however, was always to love and support family, as well as to be good to others.

4. Nan Yu

a. Gao Yaojie (1927 -) is a Chinese gynecologist and AIDS activist in Henan province, China. Gao spent her time and personal savings after she retired to save people with HIV/AIDS and curb the spread of the virus for years. She was also the whistle blower for detecting the blood-transmission of HIV due to illegal blood collection in 2007. Her work has been honored by the United Nations and many world organizations. She had spent time under house arrest and is currently living in New York City. [This is a great woman that Nan Yu has interviewed and reported when she was a journalist].

5. Regina Francies

a. My late mother, Ruby Fowler Francies, is my MAD woman. She grew up on a farm in Western Kentucky and was the second oldest of seven children. She graduated from high school and remained a factory worker her entire life. My mother is a survivor.

She survived long, tedious days seated at a sewing machine, and later, walking and standing on concrete floors – without air conditioning.

She raised my three brothers and me primarily on her own; Daddy would go on drinking binges and be gone for months at a time. Mom survived the physical and mental abuse when he returned.

She survived breast cancer and the grief of losing her breast, her hair, and her self-image.

She did not survive a botched-up outpatient surgery and died October 23, 1999. She was 58 years old. That is one year younger than I am today.

She is survived by a MAD woman. I am survivor because I was raised by a survivor. Rest in Peace, Momma

6. Sally Hastings

a. My sister, Susie, is a woman who made a big difference in my life. She is three years older than me, so she has always been telling me what to do. She is a constant in my life and still the person that I go to when the going gets tough.

7. Suzy Prentiss

a. My Nana, Lillian Prentiss, had a most profound impact on my life. Growing up, I did not see her as much as I would have liked but her influence was in my life

every day as she had raised a son, my Dad, who believed his daughters could do anything they set their minds to. From fishing in streams to climbing trees to being athletes, musicians, and leaders, my sister and I saw opportunities and possibilities everywhere. I never even realized that the world thought "girls couldn't do certain things" until I was much older. What a gift that was. My Nana also loved unconditionally, did not have time for any discrimination or oppression and was a fantastic cook who, unfortunately, never wrote her recipes down. Her spirit lives on in so many ways, thank you for letting me share her story.
